Teaching and parish work was a way of life for Sisters Mary Jane Gaspar and Suzanne Cotter for many years. They decided to retire from ministry work when they were missioned to be hostesses of the Marion House in Sioux Falls, S.D. The Marion House is a vocation, formation and hospitality house for the Presentation Sisters. As hostesses of Marian House, they live at the hospitality house and open their doors for many different guests. Together, they are able to bring their experience in working with youth to a new ministry. Sisters Mary Jane and Suzanne make the house available to girls who are here on a "Sent to Serve" program and are doing Christian Service projects, and they make it available for Sisters who need housing in Sioux Falls. Several young women have been welcomed during service experiences in Sioux Falls, and approximately 50 sisters have spent time at Marian House.

Though busy with hospitality, Sisters Mary Jane and Suzanne find their spiritual life a central part of their ministry. "We go to daily Mass at St. Mary's Parish, and we pray the office each morning and evening together," explains Sister Mary Jane. "We also participate in our yearly retreat and other spiritual offerings."

Though they live away from the motherhouse in Aberdeen, the Sisters do not find it challenging to stay connected to their Presentation family. Sister Suzanne shares, "We have sponsored potluck dinners at the house, and on some Sundays we have at least 19 Sisters participating in book discussion about vows of religious life."

The Sisters recently welcomed a group of 17 Sisters and lay women to listen to a speaker at the Marion House. They also stay connected to other Presentation ministries, specifically the Guatemalan mission. The Sisters find more opportunities than challenges in their ministry and feel blessed to carry on the Presentation spirit of hospitality in Sioux Falls. Together, they say, "We try to take it one day at a time and keep our calendars handy."

became acquainted with the Sisters assigned to Albuquerque, New Mexico, including Sister Mary Noel Kuntz and Sister Annrita Johnson who helped her through a period of anxiety. "They cared for me in the most loving, faithful, and professional way. I am forever grateful to them, not only for a speedy recovery but for the models they presented of strong faith, living as they do in the world, but not of it. It must be said they are truly heroic souls, part of that fountain of grace and mercy that is ours from a loving Father."

On Vega's 100th birthday celebration, she received a letter from President George W. Bush and Laura. The signed letter said, "You continue to make this world a better place for those who love you." Vega recommends that everyone keeps their sense of humor in life, "And laugh. No, really laugh. And make others laugh." Vega advises doing things for other people, because it brings joy as much to the giver as to the receiver. She also advises praying, "Prayer is the most powerful of all energies." She added, "God loves us beyond anything we can imagine, and I love Him."

The book, *A Walk in the Footprints of Love* by Vega P. Fahey, was published in 2010, and shares 106 years of her memories. Anne Bearman, Vega's niece, wrote a letter to the Sisters after Vega died on September 14, 2010 and shared, "One month before, she had seen her book published and enjoyed the enthusiastic response of the early readers." As Sister Annrita Johnson reflects on Vega's life, it is very clear to her that Vega exemplified Isaiah 49:5, "I am made glorious in the sight of the Lord and my God is now my strength." She accomplished many things in her 107 years of life. During her career, Vega taught elementary school and special needs students, including teaching at the New York City Public Schools. She was active in politics, public relations work and later helped start the Center of Aid to the Mexican Indian, CENAMI, which helps abandoned Indians in Mexico. Vega lived in Mexico City and Guadalajara for 26 years, and loved reading, writing, music and dancing.

Vega was proud to be a Cojourner and stated, "Sister Mary Noel Kuntz took very loving care of me after a hospitalization. She and Sister Annrita Johnson are models of charity and hard work, a real inspiration in the spiritual life. I was honored to have been invited to the Presentation Cojourner program, of peace and justice and their claims of charity and love." Sister Darlene Gutenkauf, Cojourner Co-Director for the Presentation Sisters, expresses, "I was amazed at her energy and commitment to the Church and the Presentation Sisters."



Ministering With Latinos

Mission Receives Gift of Expansion

Caminando Juntos, our Presentation outreach program to the Latinos in the Sioux Falls area, received a wonderful surprise this year. Space adjacent to their ministry center opened up and they were given first choice to rent it. At the same time a most generous donor offered the ministry a Christmas gift of \$5000 to be used for the most needy, and to help with the possible expansion project. It seemed as if it was time again to trust God and go for it!

For the past 8 years, *Caminando Juntos* had ministered out of a very limited space with only four small offices, a reception room and a meeting room. Each year as the ministry grew, the space kept getting smaller and smaller! The children were spread all over the floor of the reception area, playing their games...many times the adults had to tiptoe around and over them. One Latino man came in and exclaimed, "I didn't know you were running a day care!"

Once the decision was made to add new space, it took about two months to design the new areas, renovate, paint and carpet; the Sisters were able to keep the ministry going for most of that time. They are thrilled with the new space and all of the support they received for the expansion. More gifts came in: additional office furniture was donated by the Catholic Diocese, Avera Health and the Furniture Mission. Only a few minor things needed to be purchased.

The new addition gave *Caminando Juntos* three more offices, a break/work room, and a much larger reception area. A play area for the children was designed at one end of the waiting area room with many new toys and games available for their use. The real gift of the added space is that the ministry with the Latino clients is much more confidential. They often express how welcome they feel coming to *Caminando Juntos*. They love the new colorful space and what it says about the ministry team's respect and love for them.

On Sunday, March 13, the new ministry space was blessed by Msgr. Doyle, a generous donor to *Caminando Juntos*. All the Presentation Sisters in the area joined in blessing the ministry team, the new space and the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. They followed the blessing ritual with a "bit of spirits" and the wearing of the green. Sr. Colman won the day by serving her authentic Irish coffee, and of course we had green punch and cookies. All went home happy!

70 Years of Vowed Religious Life

Sister Bernadette Farrell is the daughter of Frank and Agnes Farrell. She was born and raised in Dell Rapids, S.D., attended Notre Dame Academy in Mitchell and entered the Presentation Sisters Community in 1941. For many years, she was an OB nurse, and then taught OB nursing at the Presentation Schools of Nursing, and also worked as a nurse midwife in the southern states and Mexico. She was not the oldest of the six children, but the oldest girl. "Since my mother was an extremely religious person, she took me to Mass with her every day. The fact my mother was so holy was the basis of my vocation."

60 Years of Vowed Religious Life



Sister Brigid Carey was born on a ranch near Isabel, S.D. and attended 12 years of school in Mobridge. She entered the Convent on November 1, 1950 and earned a master's in religious education from Notre Dame, which permitted her to respond to an invitation to teach for the US Army. She taught methods of teaching in Bangkok, Thailand and Germany. After thirty years of teaching, she earned a master's in spirituality from Gonzaga University in Spokane, Wash. She spent a year at Immaculate Heart Retreat House in Spokane giving spiritual direction, working with the divorced, widowed and separated, and doing promotional work. Next, she spent twelve months in the clinical pastoral education program at Deaconess Hospital in Spokane and St. Joseph Hospital of Orange County, Calif. Sister Brigid was then invited to be the Hospice Chaplain at the Providence Medical Center in Portland, Ore. "I've loved all in my life: 30 years of teaching (I love my darling angels), 21-years of pastoral care and caring for my mother and sister during their illness. I'm now enjoying Eucharistic ministry, St. Vincent de Paul and time to pray. I say thank you God for 60 loving years in your service. Amen and Alleluia."



Sister Ann Foley was born on a farm near Madison, S.D., and was a member of St. William's Parish in Ramona, S.D. She earned an RN diploma at Presentation School of Nursing, St. Joseph Unit in Mitchell, S.D., and entered the Convent in August 1950. She ministered in health care for nearly 50 years as a hospital nurse and long-term caregiver at many facilities including: St. Luke's Hospital, Aberdeen, S.D.; St. Joseph's Hospital, Mitchell, S.D.; Holy Rosary Hospital, Miles City, Mont.; McKennan Hospital, Sioux Falls, S.D.; Bethel Care Center, St. Paul, Minn.; Mother Joseph Manor, Aberdeen, S.D.; Presentation Convent, Aberdeen, S.D.; St. Mary's Nursing Home, Winsted, Minn. and seventeen years at Long Lake Health Care Center, Long Lake, Minn. Sister Ann describes herself by referring to the parable of Mary and Martha, "I feel I have been a "Martha" most of my life, always keeping busy and helping others. Now my time is spent being a "Mary" as I spend more time in prayer."



Sister Marie Celeste Sabers was born Mary Joan Sabers in Salem, S.D. to Elrena (Godfrey) and Emil Sabers. She attended St. Mary's School in Salem, worked at the Bell Telephone Company from ages 16-19 and entered the Presentation Convent in November 1950. She expected to become holy soon after vows, and even though this did not happen, she never considered leaving as she was at peace with her decision. Sister Marie Celeste attended Presentation College, Aberdeen, S.D.; Regis College, Denver, Colo, where she earned a bachelor's; and Loyola University, Chicago, Ill., where she earned a master's in pastoral studies. She also earned a clinical pastoral education and was certified by the National Association of Catholic Chaplains. She ministered in Presentation Sisters sponsored facilities for almost 50 years, and served on the board of trustees for 30 years in sponsored hospitals. In the fall of 2006, she retired and now volunteers part time as a Chaplain at Avera McKennan Hospital. According to Sister Marie Celeste, Presentation religious life provided her with many opportunities as she deepened her relationship with God. She enjoyed the people she was privileged to minister through the Presentation Sister institutions of healing.

50 Years of Vowed Religious Life



Sister Ruth Geraets was raised in Dell Rapids, S.D. and entered the convent in August 1961. She earned a bachelor's in elementary education and mathematics at Northern State University, a master's from the University of St. Thomas, St. Paul, Minn. and a certificate of religious life and the formative journey at St. Louis University, St. Louis, Mo. For 21 years, she taught grades 3 through 7 in Catholic Schools at Anoka and Mound, Minn. and Madison, Aberdeen and Mitchell, S.D. Then she ventured to McDowell County, W.Va. to do outreach work with those made poor as coal companies pulled out of the area, followed by ministry on the Cheyenne River Reservation directing shelters for abused and neglected women and children. After receiving her masters in pastoral ministry, she served with Holy Family in Mitchell, Nativity in Fargo, N.D. and St. Benedict Parish in Wild Rice, N.D. She managed low-income townhomes in Sioux Falls and was coordinator of formation and director of Novices 1999-2011. Presently, she is the Congregational Treasurer in Aberdeen and says, "My life has been filled with so many adventures, challenges and joys including ministering with people in the poorest counties of West Virginia and South Dakota. The one thing important in religious life, or married life, is to fall deeper in love with your God or partner each day...to live in the NOW with gratitude."



Sister Mary Jaeger was raised in Geddes, S.D. along with 13 siblings. She earned a Nursing Degree at Presentation School of Nursing and then entered the Presentation Community. Her 50 years of health care ministry consist of staff nursing, nursing management and teaching at St. Luke's, McKennan, Queen of Peace, University of Wisconsin, Department of Health in Pierre, S.D., Presentation Health System and Mission Services at Avera McKennan. Currently, she is the Director of Mission at Avera St. Anthony's Hospital in O'Neill, Neb., and Avera System Member, Avera Health Board and Avera St. Benedict's Board in Parkston. She achieved her ministry accomplishments by working with gifted people in our communities and facilities as guided by God's spirit. "The call to the consecrated life is a journey of faith like any call, any vocation with ups and downs, joys and sorrows and always God's presence breaks through and love will see me/you/us through. It is a life-giving experience with lots to let go of at first and then as the years go by I see the gifts and graces of my life more clearly."



Sister Janet Schumacher is an Ipswich, S.D. native who earned a bachelor's in elementary education from Northern State University, a master's in pastoral studies/spiritual direction from Loyola University and completed the clinical pastoral education program with Lutheran Social Services. She entered the Presentation Sisters Community in September 1961. Sister Janet was not only an elementary teacher in Catholic schools across South Dakota and Minnesota, but also served in retreat/spiritual directions ministries in seven states and campus ministries in Chicago at Loyola University for eleven years. Sister Janet recalls many special ministry moments and says, "What makes these memories so special is how inspired I am by cancer patients who, in the midst of their illness and side effects of treatments, can share how grateful they are for loved ones, the simple joys of life and their faith, which so many of us take for granted."

Presentation College President Retires

Sister Lorraine Hale, Ph.D., began her appointment as ninth President of Presentation College on June 1, 1996. A native of Australia, Sister Lorraine joined Presentation College in August of 1993 as academic dean. She has a doctorate in educational administration and supervision from Fordham University in New York; a master in religious education from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.; a bachelor in education from the University of New England, Armidale, New South Wales, Australia; and a bachelor in biological science from the University of New South Wales, Sydney, Australia. She is a member of the Presentation Sisters congregation of Staten Island, N.Y. and will return there for about a month after retiring. She plans to teach a class online for Cincinnati University on research methods for doctoral students. Sister Lorraine stated, "I want to take a year to sort things out and take the time to look and listen for my next call." She also commented, "the College is blessed and they are doing good work, I see God happening here."

Sister Lorraine feels her greatest accomplishment at Presentation College was stabilizing the institution as she helped to focus it and move it forward. In the future, the College is looking at adding a master's program and football to bring more students to the College. Sister Lorraine stated, "The new president will be walking into a moving college."

The History of Presentation College

Presentation College, PC, is a Catholic-Christian educational institution, sponsored by the Sisters of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (PVBVM). Founded in 1951, the College conferred a diploma on its graduates until 1966 when the College began to confer associate degrees in arts and science. In 1968, the College became coeducational. In 1980, the Cheyenne River Lakota Nursing School at Eagle Butte, S.D., a satellite nursing program of PC, enrolled the first class of Native American students. In 1991, the name of the school was changed to Presentation College Lakota Campus. In 1988, PC admitted its first class to a nursing baccalaureate completion program. The college was accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools to offer Associate of Arts and Science Degrees and four year baccalaureate programs in 1990. The 1,200-seat Strode Activity Center was dedicated in 1998, and a new student housing complex opened in 1999, featuring suites with private bedrooms, semi-private bathrooms, living rooms, kitchens, computers and Internet access. A new dining and recreation hall opened near the suites in 2000. In 2003, a second satellite location, Presentation College-Fairmont Campus, was opened in Fairmont, Minn. PC introduced its Wireless Initiative in 2005, and in 2006, PC joined in partnership with Kilian Community College in Sioux Falls, S.D., to offer a Bachelor of Science degree completion in Social Work. Currently, PC offers Bachelor of Science, Associate of Science, Associate of Arts, and Certificate programs through a number of delivery methods.
