Nano Farm is a model farm, where we not only raise chickens and cows, but we have exemplary gardens, a fish hatchery with 11 fishponds and a multi-use conference center. We also use solar and biogas to produce power.

Both adults and students come to the farm for a hands-on approach for learning to make and use compost for their gardens, to learn how to raise fish, and to attend workshops in our conference center.

Education

Special funds are available to sponsor students in primary, elementary, high school and college. To enhance the salaries of our employees, we pay school fees for their children. We also sponsor other students who would never have the opportunity to attend high school or college.

One of these students is Febbu. Febby's parents abandoned her when she was nine years old. When a neighbor realized she was alone, Febby was invited to live with them. At the end of the school year, Febby was taken to live with her grandparents whom she had never met. One of the teachers at Kaoma High School asked us to sponsor her since her grandparents lived a great distance from town and had no money to pay boarding fees. Today Febby is just completing her second year in college studying to be a doctor.



Redmond Loan Fund

Funded by Dr. and Mrs. Warren Redmond, the loan fund has provided loans to over 2,000 women as they work to establish or enhance a small business as a means to provide food and income for their family. After participating in workshops on Business Skills and hands-on Compost Making, they receive the equivalent of a \$100 loan. We follow-up with these women, providing support and assistance when needed.



Joy, pictured on the left, is one of the women who received money from the Redmond Loan Fund. She came to the office to express her gratitude saying, "If everyone would use compost on their gardens, there would be no poverty in Zambia." Joy had made eleven bags of compost following the workshop. She said it made a significant difference in the corn and vegetables she produced.
