She obtained an Associate Teaching Degree from Notre Dame Junior College, Mitchell, SD, a Bachelor's from Northern State Teachers College, Aberdeen, SD and a Master's in Education Administration from Marquette University, Milwaukee, WI.

Knowing she wanted to teach children about God, Sister Jean followed her heart and became a teacher. For 45 years, she shared her love of learning by enriching the lives of students, both as a teacher and principal in Catholic schools throughout SD, MN, MT and NM.

Her ministry transitioned and Sister Jean worked in parish ministry for 15 years in Huron, SD. She continued sharing her compassionate spirit with the parishioners as she taught bible studies, visited those in the hospital and by taking communion to the homebound. Feeling called to do more for those less fortunate, Sister Jean started a thrift store called the St. Francis Shop.

She continued her service to others by volunteering at Avera St. Luke's Hospital's Auxiliary Guest House and also worked in the Convent Library. Now fully retired, Sister Jean enjoys reading, doing puzzles and playing pinochle.

Together, they engage corporations through dialogue and resolutions, promoting a more just and sustainable world. She also served nine years on the Presentation College Board of Trustees.

Planting & Growing Seeds of Peace

sisters Kay O'Neil and Michelle Meyers had the distinction of receiving the first annual Artisan of Peace Recognition by the South Dakota Pax Christi Chapters, via Zoom, on Saturday, February 27, 2021.

Present were members from Sioux Falls, Watertown, Brookings and Aberdeen.

The expression, 'artisan of peace', originates with Pope Francis in an address he gave on September 21, 2016, at the World Day of Prayer for Peace in Assisi, when he said, "...believers, regardless of their faith are called to be 'artisans of peace.'" He went on to describe the word for peace a 'challenging art of communion.' In his most recent encyclical, Fratelli Tutti, he continues to describe peace in terms of 'art'. He writes, "there is an 'art' of peace that involves us

all...we cannot ignore the involvement of ordinary people." (231)

Father John Dear spoke to the Aberdeen Presentation Sisters around 1998. In conversation, Father Dear challenged Sisters Michelle and Kay to start Pax Christi in South Dakota. They organized the annual Growing Peace Conference, which drew national speakers. Some well-known peace activists included Bishop Tom Gumbleton, Father John Dear, Sister Helen Prejean, CSJ, Jack Nelson-Pallmeyer, Martha

> Hennessy (grand-daughter of Dorothy Day) and Kathy Kelly. The Presentation Sisters later collaborated on the sponsorship of these conferences with the Benedictine Sisters of Watertown, SD.

Johnny Zokovitch, the Executive Director of Pax Christi USA, has known Sisters Kay and Michelle for the past 30 years, so it was with much joy that he was able to share his admiration for all they have done. He said, "the art of peace requires skill, practice and perseverance. Peace building is not easy. Sisters Kay and

Michelle are living examples of what it takes to be peacebuilders. They are truly 'artisans of peace."

Through all they have done in the name of promoting peace and justice in our world, it is clear that not only did Sisters Kay and Michelle plant seeds of peace, but peace grew beyond anyone's imagination.

"The Conference of Presentation Sisters exists to provide opportunities for collaboration of the members on matters of mutual interest, to promote unity, to strengthen the spirit of Nano Nagle, and to encourage the works of the Sisters to fulfill the mission in the Church. In other words: greater collaboration, connection and communion." (pbvmconference.org)


The CPS vocation directors have been crossing congregational lines in partnership for several years,

Similar Name, Similar Charism and an

Overwhelming Call to Help the Poor

t's been almost 20 years since Sister Joyce
Meyer first visited the Presentation of
the Virgin Mary Sisters in Malawi, Africa.
But it wasn't until seventeen years later, that she
reconnected with the Congregation.

In 2017, at the Global Gathering of Presentation Sisters in Brookings, SD, Sister Joyce gave a presentation focused on the future of religious life and the importance of connecting and collaborating with congregations having similar charisms. It was here she remembered the Malawi Presentation Sisters.

Still thinking of this congregation, Sister Joyce, on a trip to Zambia, Africa on behalf of the Conrad Hilton Fund for Sisters and Global Sisters Report asked her congregational leader if she could visit the Malawi Sisters. She wanted to find out if these Sisters really did have the similar spirituality and charism that she remembered from those many years ago.

Arriving in Malawi, the sisters took Sister Joyce on a tour of their ministries. She learned not only of their accomplishments, but also of their struggles.

All along the way, these Sisters continue their Charism in providing compassionate love, care and service in the image of Jesus.

Of the 50 sisters, 25 are fully professed and 25 are in formation. Only five of these sisters earn stipends. They work in diocesan institutions, three as nurses and two as teachers. In Africa, "newer" congregations do not have financial resources sufficient to support income shortfall.

These women are resilient and work daily to find creative ways to support themselves because, contrary to what many think, bishops do not financially support women's religious communities anywhere in the world. Locally founded communities do not have sisters abroad who keep their future in mind. Thus, without outside help, the sisters have fewer opportunities for education and professional development.

Similar to our Aberdeen Congregation, the Malawi Presentation Sisters engage in education and healthcare. Like our foundress Nano Nagle, believing in the importance of education, they began Early Childhood Development Programs, teaching young children wherever they could, in empty buildings, even a lean-to, anywhere they could find space. Seeing the ECD success, the government asked

the Sisters to start a primary (elementary) school because the children coming from their programs were too advanced for government schools. The Congregation

then began building an elementary school on their property, brick by brick as they receive funding.

They also showed Sister Joyce a plot of land where two shell buildings stood. The buildings were very well built, but not completed for their intended purpose, a 12-bed clinic/hospital. Promises of funding had fallen through as did the project. This healthcare facility would fulfill a dream of the Congregation's first owned ministry.

"I felt their compassionate Charism so strongly, and it mirrored that of our own Congregation. I wanted to

help, to provide assistance for these Sisters, to help get them on their feet," stated Sister Joyce. "Everyone wants to stand on their own two feet. They don't want to be dependent on anyone. They are eager to learn and just needed some support."

Malawi is one of the poorest countries in Africa and, along with HIV/AIDS, has the highest infant and maternal deaths. This leaves many children and elderly without support. Healthcare clinics, especially maternity clinics, are vital to the area in keeping families together.

Working through email and What's App, Sister Joyce has been journeying with these women. She is teaching the Congregation how to apply for grants to fund their projects, working with local contractors and making connections with others who have developed rural healthcare in East Africa and elsewhere. By introducing them to various partners, the two healthcare buildings are now completed, but much funding is still needed. Furnishings, equipment, electricity hook-up, inspection fees and licenses are only a few needed items before they can even open the pharmacy. Then, there is a future dream for solar panels to keep electricity operating and costs down.

All along the way, these Sisters continue their Charism in providing compassionate love, care and service in the image of Jesus.

She ministered as a pastoral associate in Anoka and Litchfield, MN from 1978 – 1991 and pastoral administrator at St. Clara Parish, Clara City, MN from 1991 – 1997. She served as Director of Chaplaincy and Mission Services at Avera Holy Family Hospital, Estherville, IA from 1998 – 2002 followed by four years on the Presentation Sisters Leadership Council. Sister Catherine was a witness to joyful hospitality with an unconditional love for all human beings. She enjoyed visiting with people, attending sporting events and was a big Presentation College Saint's fan.

Through her 41-year educational journey, Sister SaBina received an Associate Teaching Degree from Notre Dame Junior College, Mitchell, SD, Bachelor's in Education from Northern

State College, Aberdeen, SD, Masters in English from Marquette University, Milwaukee, WI, and a Pastoral Ministry Certificate from Washington Theological University, Washington DC. She dedicated over 50 years to educating students in Aberdeen, Jefferson, Sioux Falls, Dell Rapids and Mitchell, SD; Anoka and Wilmar, MN; and Miles City, MT. She taught English and directed the Shalom Singers at Presentation College from 1969 – 1980, was Mission Effectiveness Coordinator at Presentation College and (Avera) Mother Joseph Manor from 1989 – 1999, and taught ESL at Caminando Juntos, Sioux Falls until 2010. Sister SaBina had a passion for the liturgy and the arts including co-writing songs, acting, directing productions and painting. She enjoyed cooking and making delicious homemade caramels for family and friends.

Sister Helen Jean Washtoak

Born to Life May 30, 1930 Born to Eternal Life November 22, 2020

Sister Helen Jean received a Bachelor's in Elementary Education from Northern State College in 1967 and a Masters in Religious Studies from St. Mary's, Winona, MN in 1974. Her ministry

in education spanned 35 years, from 1951 to 1986. She inspired thousands of students as an elementary educator, principal and coordinator of religious education in Catholic schools and parishes including Sioux Falls, Mitchell, Aberdeen, Mobridge, Chamberlain, SD; Anoka, Mound, Adrian, MN. Switching her focus, from 1986 to 2001, she shared her joy and compassion in pastoral care at McKennan and St. Luke's Hospital and as Director of Pastoral Care for Aberdeen Living Center. She later volunteered at the information desk at Avera St. Luke's and assisted various departments at Presentation Convent. Sister Helen Jean enjoyed history and writing poetry and she will be remembered for her leadership and organizational skills.
